The program allows students to either specifically focus on Indigenous issues or to combine their program with other undergraduate programs. The Western University Senate is one of the main governing bodies of Western University. It makes decisions regarding academic policies, university planning, budgetary items, appeals, and other crucial projects. The composition of Senate is a ratio of roughly 80 faculty to roughly 20 students. The Faculty of Social Science sends two elected Senators (who are students, just like you!) to represent the faculty at the Senate by voting on important items and sitting on decision-making committees.

SRA Self-Reported Absence

What is an SRA?

SRA's address medical and compassionate reasons for which no documentation is required. This option should be used where students expect to resume their academic responsibilities within 48 hours or less.

For absences under 48 hours in length, during which submission of course work worth 30% or less of your final grade will be missed, you will need to use the online self-reporting tool to notify your instructors.

Students will be allowed a maximum of two self-reported absences between September and April and one self-reported absence between May and August.

SRA's are not available for final examinations, midterm examinations scheduled during the December examination period, or for final lab examinations scheduled during the final week of term.

Religious/spiritual and varsity commitments require the submission of documentation through the Academic Counselling Office for accommodations.

Within the portal students will select the allowable 48 hour period (i.e. Yesterday and Today, or Today and Tomorrow). Absences start at midnight (12:00 am) on the first requested day and end at 11:59 pm the following day.

4

When completing the form, make sure you include each course and assignment or test you will miss during your absence.

5

Email your course instructor(s) within 24-hours of submitting the SRA to make alternative arrangements to complete your work.




